

St. Philip's Mission Statement:

We are happy to have you visiting St. Philip's today. If you are a guest or visitor, (in person) we hope you will take a moment to receive a welcome package and fill out the Guest Information Form inside. After filling out the form please place it in the collection plate or hand it to one of the greeters at the end of the service. (Guest online) We ask that you email us with your information, and we will mail you a welcome package.

The order of the service is given in the leaflet. If the hymns are not printed, they can be found in the Hymnal, (H1982) which is the larger, blue book or in the Lift Every Voice and Sing II, (LEVAS) which is the multi-color book.

The Great Hall is through the front doors on the right of the sanctuary, down the steps, through the doors, where fellowship is held immediately following the 10:30 AM service.

The restrooms are also through the same sanctuary door, down the steps, turn left, go straight down to the end of the hallway, and turn right. You will see the restrooms on the left.

Holy Communion is the sacred meal of the Christian faith. The Episcopal Church, as all churches rooted in the historic Christian faith, affirms that the sacrament of Baptism is the ancient and normative entry point for receiving the sacrament of Eucharist; we also believe that anyone who desires to receive the Body and Blood of our Lord is always welcome at God's table. To receive the Bread, extend your open hands to the priest. To receive the Wine, you may sip from the chalice (when we return to this custom) by gently guiding it by its base to your lips; or you may leave the Bread on your palm for a Eucharistic Minister to dip the bread in the cup and place on your tongue [intinction]; or you may receive the Wine in an individual cup.

WELCOME The Rev. Dr. Kirtley Yearwood, SR

The Rev. Kirtley Yearwood, MD., is the Chief Mission Officer at Holy Cross Health and an Episcopal Priest licensed to serve in Maryland, Washington, DC, and Virginia. He has trained in Pathology, specializing in Breast & Gynecologic, Perinatal & Pediatric, and Forensic Pathology, and studied health administration and policy.

Fr. Kirtley serves as Vicar (Part-Time) of Christ Episcopal Church, Lucketts in Leesburg, Virginia. Over the years, while practicing medicine, Fr.Kirtley served Episcopal parishes in several dioceses, including as an intentional interim consultant in congregational leadership development, mission planning, mutual ministry valuations, and clergy call search processes. He brings experience in organizational development, intentional navigation of challenging circumstances, and 'bridge-building' during leadership transitions. He is certified in appreciative inquiry, transitional ministry, and clergy coaching. He finds joy in partnering with institutions in discerning new and creative ways of exercising their mission and serving their surrounding communities.

Before joining Holy Cross Health in 2020, Fr. Kirtley served as a Spiritual Health Clinician at Emory University Hospital Midtown in Atlanta, Georgia, and taught liturgy at Candler School of Theology at Emory University. He is a certified teacher of Cognitively–Based Compassion Training (CBCT®), a system of contemplative exercises designed to strengthen and sustain compassion, through the Center for Contemplative Science and Compassion–Based Ethics at Emory University.

Fr. Kirtley integrates his professional training in medicine and theology with his passion for liturgy, end-of-life studies, compassion science, and ethics. He applies CBCT® in his daily meditation practices. He is particularly interested in practicing clinical arts as a vocation, the care of and building resilience, and cultivating well—being with physicians, other clinicians, and executive leaders. He is a peer reviewer for the spirituality section of the Association of American Medical Colleges' journal *Academic Medicine*.

In his current ministry as accountable executive for mission integration services (mission leadership, formation, ethics, spiritual care, and well-being of the ministry community) for the Maryland Region, Trinity Health, Fr. Kirtley has authored and facilitated presentations and training to various professionals on ways of promoting well−being by leaning into resilience through sustained practices of compassion. He is a Compassion−Centered Spiritual Health (CCSH™) practitioner, applying his methodology to gain insights into coaching leaders through distressing situations. He has supervised and mentored doctoral candidates' research and dissertations on promoting resilience among hospital staff on behalf of Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois.

Monastic prayer disciplines nourish Fr. Kirtley, who follows the Benedictine rule of life as a vowed member of the Society of the Resurrection (Mirfield, UK). He seeks to offer generous hospitality – 'All guests who present themselves are to be welcomed like Christ.'





In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.








Happy Anniversary St. Philip's Episcopal Church!

St. Philip's Church and St. Philip's Family Life Center, Inc. (SPFLC) have been closely tied in serving the community in the past and plan to continue being mutually supportive going forward, but the administrations of the church (by the Rector and Vestry) and the SPFLC (by a Board of Directors) are separate. The Great Hall, once known as the Family Life Center, is managed by the church.
